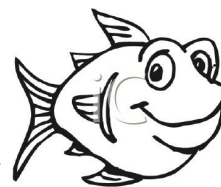

INFORMATION ON DD FORM 214

The National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) has provided the following website for Veterans to gain access to their DD 214. <http://www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/>

This may be particularly helpful when a Veteran needs a copy of his/her DD Form 214 for employment purposes. NPRC is working to make it easier for Veterans with computers and Internet access to obtain copies of documents from their military files.

Military Veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new online military personnel records system to request documents.

Other individuals with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180, which can be downloaded from the online website. Because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the requests, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask Veterans for additional information will be minimized. The new web-based application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating the record centers mailroom and processing time.

Please pass this information on to former military personnel you may know and their dependents.

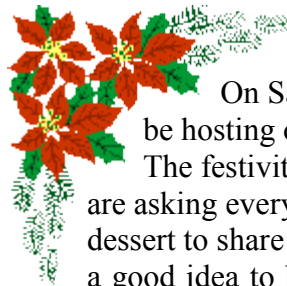
Saturday, 10 December, The Son's of The American Legion Squadron 209 will meet at 10:00 am.

Something New— Reminiscences of the Past

Reminiscences from Junior Vice Commander Lyle Hagelberg

I don’t know if any of you have lost a relative, friend or comrade, but I’ve had that dubious distinction. From 1969-1970, my boss in the Rated Officer Assignment shop at Air Defense Command (ADC) was Major Owen (Pete) Skinner, a Weapons System Officer (WSO) from Lima, Ohio. In my 10 years of military service, he was the first officer that became close to the 4 enlisted that worked for him. We would sit in the office talking as one guy to another; never did rank interfere with our conversation. One of our jobs was to assign pilots or WSOs to flying jobs in Vietnam/Thailand. Pete had big floppy black hat like pictures of the hillbillies in Appalachia. When we selected an officer from one of our 14 flying squadrons to go to ‘Nam,’ Pete would be the one to call (always telephone). He would put on his ‘black hat,’ lean back in his chair and talk to the selected officer. As I said, Pete had flown in the back-seat of ADC aircraft (F101 and B57), so he was personally acquainted with many of these officers. It was a real education to watch him notify these flyers that they were heading for the war.

Why am I talking about Pete Skinner? In July 1970, Pete put his black hat on and told us that he was next up for ‘Nam’ where he would be a navigator in an O2A spotter airplane flying out of NKP. The next thing we heard was that on December 12, 1970 his plane went down near the Ho Chi Minh Trail in Laos. His job that day was spotting trucks coming down the ‘Trail’ so a B-57 could bomb them. Wreckage and a parachute was seen from the air but no one ever heard of Pete or the pilot, 1Lt Thomas Duckett again. They were MIA. In November 1978 he was declared KIA.

Every few years I look at the DOD website to see if his status has changed. So far, it has not! At those times I get a bit nostalgia and I want to talk to someone about Pete. Thus this little story. It was the same when I visited the black wall in Washington, DC a few years ago and saw his name among the 58,267; nostalgia and tears. But I feel lucky to have known him if only for a few months. He taught me quite a bit about the rated personnel business. So comrades, when I place the MIA flag on the chair during our monthly meetings and slowly salute that flag, I am thinking about not only all our MIAs; I am also thinking about one in particular. God bless the USA!

- d. The American Institute on Philanthropy offers a Charity Rating Guide and Watchdog Report at www.charitywatch.org.
- e. All charities that participate in the Combined Federal Campaign operate under government regulations provided through the Office of Personnel Management.
- f. If you ever feel uncomfortable, say, "No thank you."

What I always wanted to know about The American Legion

The question was asked; What is the appropriate attire to be dressed as a legionnaire? The accepted standard for appropriate Legion attire is The American Legion Cap. The appropriate attire when dressing for an official function is the blue blazer and grey trousers. The Legion cap can be worn inside most building except in churches or sanctuaries. The cap is removed when entering and left off until exiting the facilities.

Most of you have heard of the four pillars of The American Legion but how many of you really know who were the four individuals that worked diligently to found the organization. These four Founders were all combat officers in the first "War to end all wars;" World War I. The armistice had been signed but at this time there were nearly 2 million US Servicemen serving with the A.E.F. (American Expeditionary Forces) in France. Morale was at an all time low as everyone was eager to get back to the states as soon as possible. This was going to be a long and boring time as they waited for ships to take them home.

There were four officers who met in Paris and discussed the problems facing the returning servicemen and decided to try and form a fraternal organization that would provide some structure for their lives once they returned home. They saw the need for a very strong organization that would provide the needed assistance in restructuring their lives as civilians. Programs needed to be established to provide for the care of those who were wounded, the orphans, widows and others who were displaced and unemployed. There was also a desire for a strong organization to represent their needs before congress. It had been reported that there were several splinter organizations already in existence back in the states that were fleecing the few Veterans that had already returned. Just as we have today there were unscrupulous individuals who claimed to be Veterans who were taking advantage of the returning Veteran's.



Recognizing the plight of returning wartime Veterans the four decided to undertake the job of initiating efforts to form a valid Veteran's organization. As most of you are aware; they were extremely successful in this endeavor and The American Legion was formed in Paris France. The question remains as to who these four officers were.

The four officers were: Lt. Col. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. Lt. Col. George S. White, Major Eric Fisher Wood and Lt. Col. William J. Donovan. These were actually the four pillars of The American Legion. They all returned safely back to the states and continued forming what we have today as the world's largest Veteran organization.

Take My Son
